
The "Round Table with Past ESS Presidents - Q/A" session

Since my appointment to the full professorship for Clinical Anaesthesiology and Translational Intensive Care Medicine at the Friedrich-Schiller- University Jena in 2020, I am responsible for the clinical and administrative management of the Division of Clinical Anaesthesiology within the Department of Anaesthesiology and Intensive Care Medicine. Furthermore, I have been given the great opportunity to continue my translational research together with my fantastic interdisciplinary team consisting of doctors and scientists at Septomics research centre in Jena (https://www.septomics.de/en/). Our research focus on investigations of pathophysiological and molecular mechanisms of pathogenmediated organ dysfunction in sepsis and the haemolytic uremic syndrome as well as novel diagnostic and therapeutic approaches to better assess and treat pathogen-mediated organ dysfunction with the long-term goal of developing and implementing novel diagnostic and therapeutic strategies to improve the prognosis of life-threatening systemic infectious diseases.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Marcin Osuchowski for the great organization of a wonderful conference in Vienna. Chapeau! My sincerest congratulations go to our new president Borna Relia. I am sure, she will do a fantastic job!

## Reminiscences of the ESS 2023 congress – Summer School

Summer School on "Polytrauma" Simulated Emergency Room, Lorenz Boehler Hospital, Vienna, 8th October 2019, 10 a.m.:

Around 20 enthusiastic ESS students took the challenge to join a simulated emergency setting at the summer school on polytrauma. The school was greatly organized by Johannes Zipperle from the Ludwig Boltzmann Institute for Traumatology in Vienna and started with a historic journey from the very beginning of polytrauma treatment. Thomas Hausner, head of the AUVA Trauma Center Lorenz Boehler in Vienna, demonstrated amazing historic pictures of conservative and operative treatment of trauma patients from the very past to the present. He even provided hand-on patient charts and surgical textbooks from the last century. Afterwards, Markus Huber-Lang, trauma-surgeon and head of the Trauma-Immunology, University Hospital Ulm, introduced the principles of surgical polytrauma management, deduced from a deep pathophysiological understanding. His lecture was mirrored by the anesthesiological aspects of polytrauma management, lively presented by Christoph Schlimp, attending anesthesiologist of the AUVA Trauma Centre in Linz. After a short lunch break, we proceeded

from theory to practical hands-on training. M. Huber-Lang and C. Schlimp simulated a clinically meaningful case of a polytraumatized young patient. The principles of anesthesiological and surgical first hour management were demonstrated and repeated by the students. In addition, advanced "patient imaging of the after polytrauma" was shown and various diagnostics were performed under a realistic time pressure condition. A pneumothorax was diagnosed and drained. Hemodynamic stabilization was achieved by infusion therapy and catecholamine support. The

hemodynamics reacted promptly and could be seen and heard by every attendee via the monitor in real-time (see figure). The clinical examination and the X-ray pictures revealed a femur fracture which was stabilized by a real external fixator on artificial bones. The results of the students' operation were great (see figure). It was indeed a remarkable feat achieved by our young Shock researchers. In a parallel room, after learning the principles of how to draw blood, the students were trained to perform thrombelastometry and to interpret the graphs in healthy and pathophysiological conditions relevant in polytrauma. As a third station, Somareality, a company focusing on virtual reality (VR) education and digital biomarkers demonstrated their latest emergency personnel training. Participants had the unique chance to dive into the virtual version of an emergency situation and to learn which measures to take first when help is urgently needed. The ESS Summer School Hand-on result of the external represented the kick-off event for the Congress of the European Shock fixator of the fractured femur –



greatly mounted by the students.

Society and received overwhelmingly positive feedback from participants. We would like to thank all the organizers and sponsors for an unforgettable teaching day!

In the context of the future of our society, one of the questions was of utmost relevance: "Would you recommend young investigators to join ESS as a member?"

With my many years of experience as investigator (as well as a former ESS president), I am happy to share a right answer with you:

ESS is a racemic mixture of scientist from a large variety of specialties - all fascinated, even mesmerized, by the enigma of shock, especially its sepsis-variant. Members of ESS performed seminal clinical and laboratory research leading to the concepts of SIRS (first published as "generalized inflammation") (by Nijmegen and Vienna groups) and CARS (Munich group).

ESS is the only scientific society where I have always felt at ease. Members communicate openly, without any restraint. There is no place for ill-advised tact; if your data require improvement, you will certainly find that out. Yet, any constructive criticism is given with best intentions and is inspirational rather than demotivating. Furthermore, the adagium binding members together is an uncompromised open collaboration. If one asks for professional help, e.g. to perform some special laboratory test in another institute, access to samples, databases etc, this help is virtually always given, often accompanied by additional valuable suggestions.

Similarly, the personal component cannot be overvalued. Within the ESS, I have found many dear friends for life and accumulated countless stories over the years of those great and heart-warming interactions. To recall just a single but very ESS-exemplary story: Once an ESS congress was organized in a conference resort deep in the woods of Scandinavia. After dinner, we (except my own, no other names disclosed) were eagerly looking for a bar. To our disappointment, there was none to be found and for the worse, the entire personnel had surprisingly disappeared. Without thinking much, we organized an ad hoc party on a landing between two stair levels by rearranging the furniture and screwing out most of the light bulbs (apparently the switches were controlled centrally) for a nice ambienté. Then we gathered whatever drinks, peanuts, cracker supplies we had brought along and threw a lovely party, enjoying each other's company. Once the scarce goods were consumed, we further explored the building and discovered a sort of a ballroom with a piano. Without giving a second thought to it, one of us began playing Viennese waltzes and tangos. We ended dancing through the night and had fun of our lives!

Thus, do not give it a second thought and simply join ESS! As Nike states it: "Just do it!" Join definitely for great science as well as for equally great fun... ESS=Energy, Science, Smile

It was a great experience to share this presentation with the doctor (i.e. Antoine Herpain) who played such an important role in putting my treatment on the right track, and also with another impressive patient testimonial. Paul: Now in the aftermath, I have to say that the members of the European Shock Society are some of the nicest people I have ever met. After the event I talked with countless congress participants, both about the accident itself and my time in the hospital as well as about the congress. Those conversations gave me an impression that these incredibly smart and hardworking individuals that I look up to are also just human beings. An impression that inspired me to try and work in the medical field as well. (Paul, 20 years old, native of Cologne, recently graduated from high school and plans to re-apply to medical school).

It takes courage to speak to a large audience of medical and research professionals. Yet, this is enormously rewarding - both to the audience as well as speakers. Many of you, ESS congress participants, were visibly moved by their testimonials. Many asked questions directly to Dennis and Paul and several of you came to me after the session's end with words of gratitude for organizing it, telling me how touched you were (despite the fact that many of you are seasoned ICU physicians). I truly believe this experience will resonate in our hearts and minds for a long time and to the benefit of better-quality science and consequently countless critically ill patients and their families.

Dear colleagues,

I am thrilled and honored to have been elected as Councilor of the European Shock Society. Serving in this capacity is a privilege, and I am devoted to developing the area of sepsis, trauma and shock medicine. I am excited to contribute to the society's purpose and to use this platform to increase our global visibility. Together, we can achieve important advances in research, education, and patient care, cementing our society's position as a major contributor in the field.

Before joining the University of Malta in 2022 as Senior Lecturer in the Department of Applied Biomedical Science, Faculty of Health Sciences, I held a tenured position at the respected Amsterdam University Medical Centre, University of Amsterdam, Amsterdam, the Netherlands, as well as faculty position in the Centre for Experimental Molecular Medicine. Following my doctoral studies in 2010, I joined the infection, immunity and sepsis research lab of Prof. Dr. Tom van der Poll at the Amsterdam University Medical Centre, Amsterdam, The Netherlands. I participated in the Molecular Diagnosis and Risk Stratification in Sepsis (MARS) study, which enrolled over 8000 patients admitted to the Intensive Care Unit of two Dutch institutions, during the initial years of my postdoctoral fellowship. Throughout this time, I developed blood transcriptomics methods that resulted in the publication of multiple research papers delineating novel molecular biomarkers for pneumonia and intra-abdominal infections, in addition to a study that unveiled four molecular endotypes in patients with sepsis. I contributed to a research endeavor that identified the metabolic foundations of immune cells that define a state known as "immune paralysis" in patients with sepsis. In addition to clinical studies, I was eager to contribute to mechanistic studies, such as those employing mouse models of pneumonia-induced sepsis. My recent work has shown that circulating monocytes obtained from patients hospitalized due to community-acquired pneumonia, a major determinant of sepsis, manifested decreased cytokine production capacities that was explained considerably by an epigenetic and transcriptomic axis.

Since relocating to sunny Malta, and becoming a member of the academic community at the University of Malta, I have been honored with the Established Investigator Award from the European Society for Intensive Care Medicine in 2022. Presently, I am in charge of a prospective, non-interventional clinical investigation concerning the immune functional ramifications of molecular endotypes associated with sepsis. Furthermore, with the assistance of local financial support provided by the Malta Council for Science and Technology, I am enlisting senior citizens to partake in a research project aimed at elucidating the epigenetic topology of monocytes as it pertains to the aging immune system or immune senescence. In summary, I aspire for my forthcoming professional endeavors to yield novel insights in the realm of infection, immunobiology and sepsis immunology, which I will eagerly disseminate to the entirety of society. Thank you for this great opportunity to make a difference!



#### **TOP 1:** Welcome from the President: Marcin Osuchowski

MO welcomed everyone to the General Assembly and expressed his delight at the large number of participants and he thanked to all those who contributed to the successful organization of the congress. He offered a warm welcome to new members and welcomed them to the ESS community. He finally stated that the General Secretary, Andrea Szabo, cannot attend the General Assembly and the Minutes will be drafted by Antigoni Kotsaki.

#### **TOP 2:** Approval of the Agenda

Agenda was sent to the ESS members in due time before the General Assembly; no further suggestions were received.

The Agenda was unanimously approved (Votes cast: 28: yes: 28; no: 0; abstain: 0)

**TOP 3:** Approval of the Minutes of the 2021 online meeting

Minutes were sent to the members in due time before the meeting.

The Minutes were unanimously approved (Votes cast: 28: yes: 28; no: 0; abstain: 0)

**TOP 4:** General Secretary Report: Andrea Szabó (the ppt, prepared by AS, was presented by Marcin Osuchowski)

Communication within the Board occurred via frequent e-mail exchanges during the period 2021-2023 including these main topics: 1) decisions and votes on events to be endorsed by the Society, 2) Discussion on the Newsletters, 3) Reports on the financial situation of the current congress by The President, 4) Proposals for personnel changes within the Council (see also TOP10-15 of the present agenda).

- (1) Membership: 12 new members recruited in 2021-2023 (after the date of the online meeting). Currently: 50 paying members including student members. Certain long standing members have not renewed their membership yet.
- (2) The ESS website continued to be managed by the General Secretary. Here you will find a statement condemning the war in Ukraine, a publication (co-authored by Marc Maegele) representing the ESS, a historical overview of the Society's congresses and history, which is an important element of this congress. ESS also endorses congresses of other societies through the ESS website. A new element has also been added to the members' database, as those who register in the database will also receive up-to-date information on their membership status and the exact date of payment of their membership fee. The possibility of online payment of membership fees is currently being developed.
- (3) Newsletters: 2 newsletters were published since the online meeting in 2021. Next newsletter will appear after the Vienna Congress 2023.
- (4) Cooperation societies: ESS is member of the Global Sepsis Alliance (since 2013) and endorses its activity (by forwarding GSA initiatives to ESS members and by posting relevant content on the ESS website); Marc Maegele remains an ESS representative of the ABC-Trauma initiative; Evangelos

Giamarellos-Bourboulis still serves as a member of the steering committee of the European Sepsis Alliance (since 2019). ESS also endorses ESTES and ESOT events.

- (3) **Long-Term Sustainability**: Our sustainability relies on the continuous influx of new members, but also experienced members, who contribute to the stability and continuity of the ESS.
- (4) **Simplifying the process of becoming a member**: Simplifying formal memberships through the ESS website may removes barriers for potential members.


